As an Achieving the Dream (ATD) school, a group from the College, including **Department Chair Shinta Hernandez** (sociology) and **Dr. Bess Vincent** (sociology), visited Pierce College in December 2018. An ATD leader school and Aspen finalist, Pierce is located in the Seattle metropolitan area. This institution is considered to be an excellent national model of how an institution can engage its faculty and staff with data to improve its completion rates and align their ATD work with the strategic plan. During our visit, we spoke with leaders from Pierce about various student success initiatives, and ultimately, we learned from one another. While so much was learned during this trip, the key Montgomery College takeaways align with five main areas: mission fulfillment, data democratization, start2finish, professional development, and assessment.

Inspirational Events at the College

On November 16, 2018, the Department co-sponsored with the Department of History and Political Science and the President's Office of Equity and Inclusion to host its first-ever Diversity and Inclusion event as part of its Ethnic Social Studies Certificate. This event called "Stories from the Workplace" included a panel of three industry experts who discussed their opportunities and challenges with inclusion and exclusion at work. Among the panelists was Mr. Eliot Pfanstiehl, CEO and founder of Strathmore Hall Foundation and husband of **Professor Cindy Pfanstiehl** (anthropology). The other panelists were Ms. Hawa Camara from GlaxoSmithKline and Ms. Timea Webster from the University of Maryland College Park. This event was very unique because the panel was moderated entirely by students of the Ethnic Social Studies Club.





The Department co-sponsored with ELITE and the President's Advisory Committee on Equity and Inclusion to host the firstever World Access to Higher Education Day (WAHED) event at Montgomery College on November 28, 2018. We joined institutions and colleges across the globe in celebration of equity in higher education. Led by **Dr. Katya Salmi** (sociology), this event consisted of five students who served on a panel and contributed their diverse stories and experiences. The student panelists discussed the challenges of accessing higher education, including the cost of tuition, transportation, and living, as well as scheduling and balancing multiple commitments, including work. The panelists also highlighted how the College reduces barriers for students through Z-courses and programs such as Achieving the Promise Academy, ACES, and Combat2College.

Part-time faculty member **Dr. Leszek Sibilski** (sociology) hosted an event at the College on December 3, 2018 to observe International Day of Persons with Disabilities. The guest of honor was 1992 Barcelonian Table Tennis Paralympian Sara Azizi. She presented on the challenges she faces as a disabled person but emphasized to the audience how she overcame and continues to overcome obstacles. As a token of appreciation, Dr. Sibilski's SOCY 100: Introduction to Sociology students were able to raise more than \$3,000 in just five days for a customized state -of-the-art multifunctional wheelchair for Ms. Azizi for which she is forever grateful.





Living the DREAM

Department Chair Shinta Hernandez (sociology) and **Dr. Bess Vincent** (sociology), along with many others from the College, attended the 15th annual national Achieving the Dream (ATD) conference called DREAM in Long Beach, CA. Montgomery College is in its third year as an ATD school. DREAM 2019 brought together more than 2,000 influential policy makers, thought leaders, and practitioners from colleges throughout the U.S. to talk about emerging strategies for critical issues such as equity, student success, data analysis, program evaluation, and many more. Dr. Jill Biden, former Second Lady of the U.S. and English professor at NOVA, delivered a powerful and inspirational speech at DREAM that left many of its attendees in awe. Each year, one of the highlights of DREAM is listening to a group of student scholars discuss their personal and academic journey. This year, one of the eight community college students from ATD network colleges is our very own student Carol Faye Walls. Carol began her life as an economically poor African American female in a male dominated family of eight in Washington, D.C. Her family was focused on the successes of her brothers, while she was told to get married, start a family, and maintain her household. At the age of 44, Carol experienced numerous setbacks, including three battles with uterine cancer and family loss. Despite this, she continued her journey to achieving her educational dreams. In 2015, she began attending Montgomery College and is a General Studies major. Carol plans to earn a degree in Social Work with an emphasis on female domestic violence.

The Department is fully committed to making higher education affordable, accessible, and equitable for our students. We have made great achievements with the number of sociology and criminal justice Z-courses that enable all students to receive a high quality education with no associated textbook costs through the use of open educational resources (OERs). To continue embracing the idea of "open" for our students, Department Chair Shinta Hernandez (sociology) partnered with Dr. Michael Mills, Vice President of ELITE, to launch the College's first-ever United Nations Sustainable Development Goals (UN SDGs) Open Pedagogy Faculty Fellowship in Summer 2018. Fifteen faculty from 12 disciplines were grouped into interdisciplinary and intercampus teams to create renewable assignments that would engage their students in achieving global justice through the UN SDGs framework. Faculty fellows from our Department include sociology instructors Dr. Naliyah Kaya and Dr. Katya Salmi who were each teamed up with instructors from other disciplines and other campuses. These assignments were delivered in 16 courses and 25 sections during Fall 2018 in which more than 570 students were enrolled. As a culmination, a student showcase was held on February 26, 2019 in which nearly 100 people listened to 16 students talk passionately about how they engaged in the community to transform the world through their open pedagogy coursework. During their presentations, some students discussed how powerful these assignments were to them, causing many to change their behaviors, mindsets, and even their career trajectory. Some of these students will continue to present at future events at the College and beyond. In just a short period of time, this fellowship has received international attention, including highlights at OpenCon 2018 at the United Nations Headquarters, a partnership with a university in Canada, and a possible collaboration with a university in Ethiopia.

Around the World and Back

Part-time faculty member **Professor Tara Tetrault** (anthropology) went on the January 2019 Short-Term Study Abroad trip to Ghana, West Africa with a group of faculty and students. This opportunity allowed her to return to Ghana after many years. On this trip, she focused on the continuity and innovation in the Ghanaian art and culture. Among many things, this group examined the evolution of pottery and its use throughout the years. One of the most interesting lessons learned on this trip was that Elminan potters made vessels, especially the women. Men also crafted their own canoes since fishing continues to be a central part of the economy for many coastal villages. This group also had an opportunity to see traditional Kente cloth weavers in Kumasi. Kente cloth is a two-faced fabric with different patterns on both sides. Overall, this experience allowed the group to witness the thriving art industry in Ghana. Industrialization has certainly taken place in many areas. One evidence of this is that water pumps have now replaced the clay pots once used to catch water from rooftops. In fact, satellite dishes, electrical equipment, bicycles, and other modern items are now sold in shops and grocery stores.

The Department will play an integral role in the execution of these student centered events, but the events will include all of the social sciences: anthropology, criminal justice, economics, education, history, political science, psychology, and sociology. Starting with a keynote speaker and a student panel, each EXPO will then move the students towards various tables where they can get information and assistance. Professional Conferences, Fellowships, and Other Accomplishments

In addition to teaching, the faculty in this Department are passionate about engaging in work outside of the classroom in which the experiences will then be used inside the classroom. Some faculty have attended and/or presented at conferences, and others have become involved in various fellowships and other opportunities at the College or in the community.

Dr. Tracie Witte (sociology) was selected to be a faculty fellow in the MC-Smithsonian Faculty Fellowship Program. This semester's theme is "The Search for an American Identity: Building a Nation Together." This cohort of faculty fellows is spending this semester traveling to the Smithsonian for a series of seminars and tours. They will then implement relevant activities and assignments that incorporate museum objects with coursework. Through this fellowship, faculty and students have an opportunity to experiment with pedagogy that enables more sophisticated critical thinking and problem solving skills.

Dr. Naliyah Kaya (sociology) has done a number of speaking engagements, including a podcast with public radio station WYPR on how the arts, especially poetry, can be used for activism. She also served on a panel at the University of Maryland College Park, discussing the intersections of culture, faith, identity, and leadership development. Dr. Kaya has also co-written two articles on leadership that will make their way to academic resources.

Professor Ginger Robinson (criminal justice) served as a judge for the Baltimore City High School Mock Trial Competition in January 2019. In cooperation with the Maryland Judicial Conference and Maryland State Bar Association, an annual Mock Trial Competition is held and has involved almost 50,000 students from most counties in Maryland. The top four teams from Maryland advance to Annapolis for the semi-finals, and the top two advance to the state championship, which is held in the Courts of Appeals courtroom in Annapolis. In addition, Professor Robinson also attended the Montgomery County Commission for Women's Annual Women's Legislative Briefing.

Criminal justice faculty **Professors Debbie Grubb, Ginger Robinson, and Sean Fay** facilitated their Law, Government, Public Safety and Administration Program Advisory Committee meeting held on February 4, 2019. Discussions centered around the upcoming field trip to the Montgomery County Public Safety Training Academy in March 2019. Fifty Montgomery College students, along with MCPS students, will have an opportunity to tour police and fire training facilities and meet with recruiters. **Department Chair Shinta Hernandez** (sociology) enjoyed partaking in these rich conversations around student success, external partnerships, and industry alignment.

Part-time faculty member **Professor Terilee Edwards-Hewitt** (anthropology) engaged in an intensive one-year grant-funded project designed to recognize, celebrate, and increase public awareness of the current diversity of the City of Alexandria, VA. This project aimed to involve members of the immigrant community with the museums in Alexandria and to share experiences with the wider community. Interviewees discussed the culture shock they experienced upon moving to the U.S. Professor Edwards-Hewitt used oral histories as a way to get in-depth information about personal and cultural history and the immigration experience. Her article "Immigrant Alexandria: An Ongoing Oral History Project in Alexandria, Virginia" was recently published in the *Journal of Urban Anthropology*.
